My name is and I am 16 years old. I have been a 4-Her in Rockingham County for 12 years. I am the current Rockingham County Youth Council President and the North Central District Reporter. I am a Junior at the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics in Durham, North Carolina. NCSSM is a public boarding school for high achieving high school students across North Carolina. I love going to school at NCSSM. I am learning so many cool things and I am looking forward to bringing back some projects I have done at NCSSM to Rockingham County, especially some of the chemistry projects. I grew up in Ruffin, North Carolina with my Mom, Dad, and two sisters, I enjoy theatre, singing in choruses, reading, knitting, playing soccer, tennis, and swimming.

4-H has had a major impact on my life since before I was even old enough to be a 4-Her. I have grown up in the program learning all about leadership, public speaking, community service, and lots of different activities. 4-H has given me many great friendships and life values.

This year in the project area of Family and Consumer Science I have enjoyed cooking, sewing, knitting, and making crafts. I made a prayer Shawl, and mended pants for my parents. I taught a blueberry jam making class and a cooking and food safety class to youth in Rockingham County. I won second place in the state dairy poster contest for my poster. I knitted and donated a scarf to the nursing home. I learned how to use new food technology such as tasty cakes mug cake and a smore making machine. I also learned how to paint with coffee and defrost a refrigerator. I attended an etiquette class and learned a lot about table manners in a formal setting. I also volunteered for this year's Make-It and Take-It workshop.

This year in the project area of Citizenship I have explored many parts of our government, done many community service projects, and held office on the district, county, and local level. I met with school board members to discuss future improvements for the education in Rockingham County. I also met with Senator Phil Burger and Representatives Kyle Hall and Bert Jones and received a tour of the State Legislature Building. I attended Citizenship focus this year and learned about the responsibility of voting and the pressured County Commissioners are faced with. I ran and now hold the offices of Rockingham County Youth Council President and North Central District Reporter. I also carried our counties flag proudly during the flag ceremony at this year's NC Congress.

This year in the Science Project Area I have explored predation rates on fish and learned a lot about chemistry, lab safety, and the process of research. I ran an experiment of the predation rate of Gambusia Holbrooki on Daphnia Magna. During this experiment, I learned a lot about reading primary documents, forming hypothesizes, creating an experimental design, collecting data, gathering results, and presenting results. In lab safety, I learned about wearing eye and hand protection, pants, and closed toe shoes, disposing of waste, using and taking care of equipment such as a Bunsen burner and microscope, and lab etiquette. This year I learned many cool chemistry experiments such as making chalk and silver ornaments. I many basic tests such as the oxygen test in which you can test for the presence of oxygen in a closed crucible. I also learned about concentrations and heat as a source of energy in an experiment where I got to blow up a gummy bear.

Many people have helped me during my time in 4-H. My parents have helped me of course. I never could have accomplished half of the things I have without them. My 4-H agent, Morgan Maness, has taught me to do many new things and always pushes me to do and learn more. My sisters,

, have helped me with so many of my 4-H projects. From teaching

me to knit a Shawl to teaching a workshop of shiitake mushroom log inoculation, they have always been there to support me. These are just a few of the people who have helped me throughout my 4-H journey. I never could have accomplished some of the things I have without their constant encouragement.

I have taught a cooking class for the youth in Rockingham County, in which they all learned basic food preparation safety, nutritional values, and had a lot of fun eating food they made themselves. I planned, organized, and ran a guide to creating and running your own service project workshop at State Council Conference this year. My sister, and I taught a Shiitaki mushroom log inoculation class at teen retreat in which youth in the district got to inoculate a mushroom log and learn the use and value of shiitake mushrooms. I taught the workshop "What Color are You" to the Rockingham County Youth Council after having learned it at Youth Voice. The workshop teaches each person what color personality they have, their strengths and weaknesses, how you interact with other colors, and helps the individual gain awareness about themselves and their abilities to work as a team member. I volunteered this year for Rockingham Counties "Make It and Take It" Holiday Craft Day. Youth got to make peanut butter and jelly reindeer, Christmas cookies, reindeer stable, and many other cool holiday crafts. I taught *Rockin' Roost* 4-H Club to make blueberry jam. They learned the process from taking the first berry off the bush to spreading the finished jam on a biscuit.

One of my goals in life is to become a successful dentist. I decided to become a dentist when I was six years old. I was inspired by my childhood dentist. He was kind, funny, and wanted to help everyone he could. My goal is to be just like him. In order to reach that goal, I have the goals to get into a good college majoring in Chemistry and then get accepted into dental school, graduate, and get a job as a dentist.

In 4-H I have enjoyed cooking, sewing, knitting, electric projects, meeting new people, helping youth, making posters, and becoming a county and district officer. I have taught sewing and craft, jam making, community service, team-building, cooking, nutrition, and shiitaki mushroom inoculation workshops. I have attended or volunteered at Make It and Take It, Teen Retreat, Winterfest, Electric Congress, North Carolina 4-H Congress, State Council Conference, Citizenship Focus, Summer Adventures, and various club functions.
